

## Minimally Invasive Procedure (MIP) for Hemorrhoidectomy Compared to Conventional Hemorrhoidectomy

The benefits of MIP for hemorrhoidectomy include less time in the hospital and less post-operative pain, itching, incontinence, and constipation. In addition, patients who undergo MIP generally experience a quicker recovery period, fewer overall complications, and less need for post-operative pain medication.



### Clinical Studies of MIP

Several clinical studies have shown positive results for MIP for hemorrhoidectomy. Compared to patients undergoing conventional surgery for hemorrhoidectomy, patients who underwent MIP returned to normal activities, including work, in a significantly shorter amount of time (17.1 days vs. 22.9 days).

### How MIP for Hemorrhoidectomy Works

When a surgeon performs MIP for hemorrhoidectomy, the sagging tissue is lifted up and repositioned using a special device. This reduces blood flow to internal hemorrhoids. Typically, internal hemorrhoids shrink within four to six weeks after the procedure.

MIP for hemorrhoidectomy is performed in an area where there are no sensitive nerve endings, while traditional procedures are performed in an area where many nerve endings are affected. Thus, MIP for hemorrhoidectomy results in less pain than the traditional procedure.

### Risks and Complications

As with any surgery, there are risks with MIP for hemorrhoidectomy:

- If too much muscle tissue is drawn into the device, it can result in damage to the rectal wall, resulting in inflammation or infection.
- The internal muscles of the sphincter may be damaged, resulting in short-term or long-term dysfunction, such as severe pain or incontinence.
